

## **UNDER THE RADAR**

Little things can cause big problems, and that goes double in the world of cystic fibrosis (CF) treatment and advocacy.

CF is a complicated condition, the science itself is complicated and often only partially understood. New information comes to light, old assumptions are challenged. It can be tempting to turn a blind eye but hidden in the mess of figures and vocabulary are lifesaving lessons and insights.

During my time as CEO of Cystic Fibrosis Australia I have tried to make CF education a priority alongside Research, Advocacy and Outreach. For those Australians living with CF and for all the rest of us it is crucial to be up to date and aware.

'Mycobacteria' is a tricky word because it refers to many things at once. It is a Pandora's Box of complex micro-organisms, all of them with inscrutable scientific names in Latin or an alpha-numeric.

There are over 190 species of bacterium in this genus, they are real and they are dangerous – especially to those who live with CF.

In cases like these we need a guide, a sage voice of knowledge and reason to help us map the risks in our environment, and we're in luck. Professor Bell also leads the Lung Bacteria Laboratory at UQ's Children's Health Research Centre and has more than 260 peer reviewed publications.
